### **SAFE STATIONS INITIATIVE**

Anne Arundel County and Annapolis City fire and police stations are designated safe environments for individuals seeking assistance from heroin/opioid addiction. Those seeking help can visit any fire or police station 24/7 to be linked with a substance use disorder treatment program.

### **DRUG AND ALCOHOL USE PREVENTION AND EDUCATION FOR COUNTY YOUTH**

The Prevention and Education Services Office helps to increase awareness of the risks associated with drug and alcohol use among young people in Anne Arundel County. The program provides information, training, presentations and exhibits to county schools, after-school programs, community groups, faith-based programs and parent groups. ### **DENTAL HEALTH SERVICES**

The Department of Health provides dental services by appointment to income-eligible children, young adults, expectant mothers and to adult participants in the county REACH program. Dental clinic locations are in Annapolis (3 Harry S. Truman Parkway, 410-222-7138) and in Glen Burnie (North County Health Building, 791 Aquahart Road, 410-222-6861). Services include cleaning, fluoride treatment, periodontal treatment, sealants, fillings, root canals, extractions, crowns, bridges, oral health education and dental health referrals.

### **WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN (WIC)**

The WIC supplemental nutrition program provides free nutritious foods, nutrition education, breastfeeding support and resource referrals for pregnant, breastfeeding and postpartum women, and to infants and children up to age 5. **The Department of Health's Strengthening Families Program  
Helps Build Stronger Families and Communities**

The Anne Arundel County Department of Health offers the free Strengthening Families Program to families with children ages 6-17. Strengthening Families is an evidenced-based, 14-week session that provides training in parenting and in developing young people's life skills. Since 2013, the program has served more than 1,300 county residents.

Strengthening Families helps parents and caregivers to improve family interaction, provide effective discipline, set constructive limitations, and to learn methods to improve their children's behavior. Participants also learn the negative impact substance misuse has on family relationships. This program helps children develop better communication and social skills to understand their feelings, solve problems, resist peer pressure and comply with family rules.

The Strengthening Families Program is currently accepting families for sessions beginning in March 2019.

For families residing in Pasadena or the northern and western sections of the county, Strengthening Families will be held every Tuesday beginning March 12, 2019 from 5:30 p.m. to 8 p.m. at Marley Middle School, 10 Davis Court, Glen Burnie, MD 21060.

For families residing in the Annapolis area and southern part of the county, Strengthening Families will be held every Wednesday beginning March 6, 2019 from 5:30 p.m. to 8 p.m. at Walter S. Mills-Parole Elementary School, 1 George and Marion Phelps Lane, Annapolis, MD 21401.

The free program provides dinner, transportation and on-site babysitting for younger children. Attendance incentives, such as gas cards and store gift cards, are also provided.

**Are You 50 or Older?  
Department of Health Recommends Colorectal Cancer Screenings**

March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month, and the Anne Arundel County Department of Health urges all adults age 50 and older to get screened for the disease. Your doctor may start screenings earlier based on your risk factors.

In the county, colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death (after lung cancer). Colorectal cancer usually has no early symptoms, but treatment is most successful when the disease is detected early by screening.

To help county residents learn about the disease, the Department of Health's Learn To Live program offers a free Colorectal Cancer Prevention Information Kit. It can be ordered from [www.LearnToLiveHealthy.org](http://www.LearnToLiveHealthy.org) or the Learn To Live Line, 410-222-7979. The kit contains information on how the disease can be detected and treated; information on healthy behaviors that can help prevent cancer, such as regular exercise and eating fiber-rich foods; and a list of medical providers that offer free screenings for eligible county residents.

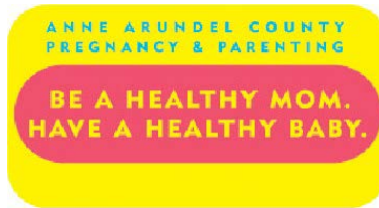

**Department of Health Warns Pregnant Women Against Drug Misuse**

Did you know that using cigarettes, alcohol or illegal drugs during pregnancy can harm the mother and her baby? Everything a pregnant woman ingests can affect the baby's growth and wellness.

Pregnant women who smoke expose their babies to nicotine and the chemicals in cigarettes. If the mother smokes, her baby may be born early, develop a dependency to nicotine, have breathing and behavioral problems, or possibly die before birth or in the first year of life. The effects of secondhand smoke can also cause babies to develop breathing problems, ear infections and dental cavities.

If the mother drinks alcohol while pregnant, her baby can be born too small and may develop visual and hearing, learning, sleeping or eating problems.

Pregnant women who use illegal drugs, including marijuana, heroin and cocaine can cause their babies to be born early; grow slowly; have heart problems or a stroke; have shaking, vomiting and other withdrawal symptoms; or suffer lifelong disabilities.

Most illegal drug users who think they might be pregnant, should stop using the drug and talk to a doctor immediately. However, heroin or opioid users will need to see a doctor to help them gradually get off the drug. Stopping opioids too suddenly can harm the baby.

#### **Anne Arundel County Department of Health Provides In-School Vision and Hearing Screenings**

Anne Arundel County Department of Health vision and hearing technicians and school nurses conduct mandated vision and hearing screenings in public schools each year. The screenings are for children in preschool, kindergarten, first and eighth grade, and for students new to Anne Arundel County schools. Special education students receiving speech therapy may also be recommended for screening. Department of Health vision and hearing technicians also administer vision and hearing screenings at private schools, nurseries and day care programs to ensure that the appropriate children are screened. Children who wear glasses should bring them to school on the day of the screening. Students in the following schools and programs will be screened in March:

March 7	Indian Creek Lower School
March 8	Indian Creek Upper School
March 11	Annapolis Area Christian School Lower School

Children are screened in order to detect vision or hearing problems that may impair a child's ability to perform successfully in school. If a potential deficiency is detected, a letter is sent to the parents or legal guardians informing them of the results. The parents are advised to contact the child's doctor for further testing and advice.
